## **TEACHING EXPERIENCE 2024-1991**

From Fall 2002 through Fall 2015, I taught <u>87</u> courses at CSU Fullerton and Chapman University in Orange, California: 36 courses on British literature, 19 on world literature, 20 on criticism, theory, and genre, 8 on American literature, and 4 on composition. Before that time (at UC Irvine from 1991-2000), I taught a total of <u>26</u> courses: 19 sections of basic and advanced composition, 2 genre surveys, and 5 assistantships in literature courses. In 2024-2025, I have taught seven Shakespeare courses as a volunteer for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI at UNLV). In all, that makes 120 courses. Details below:

# SHAKESPEARE (7 TOTAL)

Shakespeare's Comic and Tragic Modes. A ten-week survey course exploring the variety available in Shakespeare's comedies and tragedies. (1) *A Midsummer Night's Dream, Twelfth Night, Julius Caesar, King Lear;* (2) *The Merry Wives of Windsor, Troilus and Cressida, Romeo and Juliet, Timon of Athens.* <u>2 courses</u> Spring 2025.

Shakespeare's Comic and Tragic Modes. A ten-week survey course exploring the variety available in Shakespeare's comedies and tragedies. *As You Like It, Measure for Measure, Macbeth, Hamlet.* <u>2 courses</u> Fall 2024.

Shakespeare's Outsiders. An eight-week survey course that covers some of Shakespeare's most compelling "outsiders" as protagonists. *Richard III, The Merchant of Venice, Othello.* <u>2 courses</u> Summer 2024.

Shakespeare's Romance Plays: a Selection. A ten-week survey course that explores the special "romance" genre among Shakespeare's plays. *Pericles, The Winter's Tale, The Tempest.* <u>1 course</u> Spring 2024.
